DEAN'S LETTER

FAITH MEANS WE DEPEND ON GOD NOT ON OURSELVES!

"The essence of faith is being willing to depend on God rather than yourself. Every day acknowledge that you are weak but you are resting in his strength."

"Daily Strength - A Cancer Patient's Guide
to Spiritual Survival" was a tremendous
help to me while I was receiving treatment for
cancer. I experienced tiredness like never
before and I had to apply that truth to my life,
"Faith is being willing to depend on God
rather than myself."

The words of Psalm 46 which went with this advice were equally powerful: "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging."

During the months of treatment when my physical strength was severely depleted I found strength and hope came from verses like these and from the prayers and support of countless numbers of people. I am very grateful to my extremely dedicated consultant and her team and to everyone who sent cards, texts, books, gifts, food, and most of all the great wave of prayer that has carried me and my family throughout this time.

Ongoing I will be assessed regularly by the Haematology nurses. However, my Consultant and Haematology team recently informed me that I am in remission and my 'results are better than expected.'

God's Faithfulness is beyond words and the prayers prayed in Faith by God's people, and answered so powerfully, have reaffirmed my belief that true 'Faith requires me to be willing to depend on God rather than myself.'

It is one of the best feelings ever to be told by medics, that my treatment has been so wonderfully successful and to know that God's healing is in no small part a fantastic answer to the prayers of so many people across this island and beyond.

This is a season of thankfulness. I am so thankful to be in remission and thankful to the Lord Jesus for hearing the prayers of everyone who prayed for my healing. Thank you each and all for your prayers and kindness to me over the last number of months.

A further scripture verse and thoughts that gave me strength was Matthew 23:10 - "There is only one life leader... Christ!" ('The Message') therefore we are to "Combine a fighting spirit to live with a willingness to leave it all up to God!" Blessings in Christ to you all.

SOUTH SUDAN INFORMATION EVENING

South Sudan is the world's youngest country. Formed in 2011 in a split from Sudan, the country has had a troubled beginning. Lisburn Cathedral has a long-standing partnership with the diocese of Yei in South Sudan and there have been several visits between the parishes over the years. A team from Lisburn Cathedral visited South Sudan in 2011 as they were celebrating their independence.

Since then, there have been several attempts to revisit the country but due to civil unrest and covid it has not been possible.

In April 2018, Sam led a team to visit the South Sudanese church in exile in Uganda and the Bishop of Yei, Bishop Levi and his wife visited Lisburn Cathedral in 2022.

Now however we would love to reconnect with the people in Yei. We hope to take a team out to South Sudan with CMSI in spring/summer 2026.

EUROPEAN HERITAGE OPEN DAY 2025

Every September the government promotes Heritage Open Days, a particular emphasis on history and heritage. In doing so it encourages people to visit a couple of hundred places across Northern Ireland, many of which are not normally open to the public.

The Cathedral has featured for many years in the publicity material and 2025 was no exception. So on Saturday 13th September we threw open our doors to the wider public from 10am to 4pm. We had around 70 visitors many of whom stayed for up to an hour.

So what did we do? Well this year we had a couple of apprentice tour guides as well as 2 old hands. Bryn Lister spent the day in the graveyard (good job the weather was kind) telling visitors the story of some of the key folk buried there. Bryn also told the story of how parishioner Henry Munroe was hanged at our gate in 1798.



Inside Tracey Carberry has become an expert on some of those whose memorials are in the Chancel.

Julian Netherton and Ken Gibson (the old hands) talked about the building, timelines and some of the interesting characters from our past. Jacqui Lister provided a warm welcome and some warm drinks and snacks to visitors.

The highlight was Alison Fairley who entered into the spirit of things by not only talking about the Barbour Window and telling the story of the suffragettes and the 1914 bomb at the window but by appearing in costume as the key conspirator in that

action.



In the city centre Lisburn Orange Hall and St Patrick's Roman Catholic Church were also open. We had visitors from as far away as Magherafelt and it was great to meet Rev Clyde Irvine who had been a curate in the Cathedral from 1962 to 1965 along with his wife who had filled in as organist during part of their time in Lisburn. Many of those we spoke to had never been in the Cathedral, quite a number admitting to rarely being in any church. Ken has followed up with a couple of folk who had questions about family records and so on.

Also during the summer our walking group "Stronger Together" met every Tuesday.



GOD OF CREATION

In Genesis 9 God describes the rainbow as a sign of His eternal promise to Noah. That He will never again destroy the earth by flood, and as such the rainbow has become a symbol of God's love and faithfulness. We know a rainbow is a natural phenomenon, being formed as light shines through water, the light being bent and reflected leading to the colours of the rainbow. But God created the light and the water - so I guess the rainbow too!!

In Ezekiel 1:28 the prophet Ezekiel uses the image of a rainbow to describe the vision of the majesty and awe-inspiring nature of God's presence, and the brilliance that surrounded the heavenly throne. This rainbow image of God's throne is also used in Revelation 4:3 and an angel is described as having a rainbow on his head in Revelation 10:1. The rainbow image is clearly a stand out in God's creation.

Although we can humanly understand the creation of a rainbow, I think we would all agree that when God created the earth and said afterwards 'it was good' that was probably the understatement of all time!! While frolicking around the circumference of the Conor diocese last April in the Conor Big Run the team witnessed some of the most stunning views in our totally stunning country, taking in the east coast and particularly along with the north coast. I will never

forget the run from Balintoy into Bushmills taking in ocean from the hills, particularly made more beautiful by the rain and possibly the knowledge that day 2 was coming to an end!!

However much as I still smile when I look at these photos and relive the memory of this time, my biggest memory was more how God truly shone in the people involved and those we met as we run along. I remember a conversation with a lady who had a dog called Victor Victorious who we were able to share the reason for our journey (the lady, not the dog!), and the farmer Sid we met walking in the back roads before Portglenone and we had the privilege of praying with him for his ongoing cancer journey. And of course those that shared the journey and supported the endeavour - through each person I felt God's love.



God makes no mistakes and the epitome of His 'understatedly good' creation is us. You can share God to the person beside you and demonstrate His love as His ambassador to the world circles we live in.

We can show God in the way we say please and thank you, hold a door, look people in the eye as we speak, drive courteously and gracefully, respect those older as well as younger (and same age!) and probably Jesus said it best when He said 'love your neighbour as yourself'.

Creation is awe inspiring but so are you sometimes we just need to realise our ability to encourage those around us, to actually do it, and be ready to share our faith in words as well as actions.

UPDATE FROM THE TREASURER CHURCH HALL

Often, when in the midst of something, it can be hard to hold a wide perspective and step back and see your immediate situation as others may perceive it. As a firm reminder of this, I was recently asked if I could provide something of an overview as to why we're raising money for the hall.

Over 10 years ago, we undertook a massive programme of refurbishment in the church and rectory, giving us the facilities we have today. The hall on the other hand has not had any substantial work or changes to the hall areas, since the creation of the McCammon room in 1989.

Since then time has passed, I got my Alevels, found a job, got married, raised a couple of kids, was asked to serve as Treasurer and now, way too many years later, the hall is in need of a number of areas of work to secure the building from the elements, prevent water ingress in the roof, repair damp and rot, improve the look of the hall ceilings and generally secure the building to ensure it remains a functional

and pleasant space for the many, many groups and activities who regularly use it, alongside our seasonal and irregular events, from BBQ's, installations and celebrations to funeral teas, first aid courses and even somewhere to dry our tents after Summer Madness!

In 2023, the Vestry agreed to look at further refurbishment work to meet these demands and since then we have been gradually raising funds to support the refurbishment work on the Church Hall. The aim was set to save as we can, so we can afford to undertake this essential work, while not impacting on our day-to-day ministries and outreach work and this means that the progress is incremental.

As we build funds, it puts us in a stronger position to seek additional funding from grant bodies, that may offer to match what we have raised. In the last two years we have had grant funds from Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council towards the replacement of the windows, but other options for funds have been limited.

The rotten window frames were replaced in 2024, removing any risk of them falling apart, enhancing the look of the hall and improving the ventilation options and heat retention of the building.

The further work that is needed on the exterior, will not result in any radical changes to the building style, structure or

functionality, but will ensure it is fit to stand and remain wholly usable for the next few generations. This work includes:

 Brick work – all growing plants need to be extracted to prevent further damage and the brickwork needs repointed across the whole building.



 Sandstone blocks and edge stones need repaired or replaced. In a few cases this is cosmetic, but mostly these stones form the first line of defence against the weather, and once compromised, weather damage then increases exponentially.



- The area around the main door suffers from damp and this needs investigated and repaired.
- Drains and gutters need enhanced to better cope with the trees, leaves and volume of rain and wind the building is exposed to and the roof needs updated to better protect the building.
- Cosmetic enhancements doors (internal and external), painting, false ceiling replacements.

The question has been asked, could we not knock it down and build a shiny new hall, with better offices, more storage and a new set of facilities. This has been considered, however the costs and obstacles to this are notable and include, but are not limited to:

Likely funds needed are estimated to be in excess of £1.5m, three times, what we plan to spend on the current work.

Access for substantial demolition and groundwork would need to be agreed and carried out with the co-operation of the council due to likely impacts on Castle Gardens and the need to use it to access any major building work. We have a great working relationship with the council, one we'd like to keep.

Working within the confines of a listed building (the church) and close proximity to the cemetery and the historic site of Castle Gardens, means any substantive excavation work would also increase the risk of needing some archaeology to be carried out, further increasing costs and putting the project at risk.

The more substantive the work, the longer the time where facilities are not available for the many current groups who use them.

To put this in context, the hall is normally in use on a term time week at least 5 days a week and usually more than once per day on those occasions.
