THAT WAS THE WEEK THAT WAS!

From the moment the Cathedral doors opened on Friday 8th we had a steady stream of visitors from far and wide visiting the poppy exhibition. This was the culmination of five months of intense planning and preparation – and production of thousands of poppies. We owe a huge thank you to the members of Lisburn Cathedral who not only created poppies but shared the patterns with family and friends. Poppies arrived from as far away as Limerick and came in their hundreds from our local community and beyond.

Almost 1000 visitors came through the doors of the Cathedral to view the poppy displays (inside and outside), read the memories boards, view quilts, models, paintings, pictures and personal documents and medals.

On Saturday 9th, Mayor Dickson of Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council formally opened the exhibition. Dr. Brian Walker delivered two talks on the lives of two army chaplains and Gemma McLoughlin entertained the visitors with songs of the period – she was our very own 'Vera Lynn'! A very successful cream tea event took place in the Cathedral Hall on Saturday followed by an opportunity for afternoon tea in the hall on Sunday afternoon.



Eight members of our congregation were recorded sharing their war time stories or those of a family member. The video was shown during the exhibition and is now available on Lisburn Cathedral's YouTube channel.

We were honoured to welcome the High Sheriff for County Antrim, Mrs Patricia Perry and family, The Deputy First minister, Emma Little Pengelly, Sorcha Eastwood, MP for Lagan Valley and various local councillors to the exhibition.

Ian Bingham, Head of Christian Action Research and Education (CARE) in NI, will be speaking on the topic of **Christians in Politics** in the McCammon Room, at 7.30pm on Tuesday 4 March 2025.

CARE NI speaks up for the most vulnerable in society, from preborn babies and women facing crisis pregnancies, to those struggling with gambling addiction and children facing online harms.

Prior to joining CARE, Ian worked for Belfast Bible College as their Engagement Officer and before that he worked for 15 years as a Religious Studies and PE teacher.

Our Autumn/ Winter programme resumed after the Summer break with a talk about the work of the South American Mission Society by the Rev. Stephen McElhinney. It was good to learn about the ongoing work of S.A.M.S. in the church in South America.

Stephen finished his talk with an acrostic on the word **C.A.M.E.O** under the headings of Character, Attitude, Mentorship, Endurance and Openness which the Cameo members found both interesting and inspiring.

Details of the acrostic are as follows and we hope that everyone of all ages reading them will be encouraged in their faith.

C - Character

- In old age, one's character is often fully formed, and it reflects a lifetime of experiences, choices, and values. This is a time to showcase the strength of character through integrity, humility, kindness, and faith.

Proverbs 22:1 "A good name is more desirable than great riches; to be esteemed is better than silver or gold." A welldeveloped character becomes a person's enduring legacy.

A - Attitude

- Maintaining a positive and godly attitude is essential in the latter years. This involves cultivating contentment, gratitude, and hope even in the face of physical decline or life's challenges. A joyful and trusting attitude in God sets a powerful example to others.



Philippians 4:11 "I have learned in whatever situation I am to be content." A positive attitude reflects spiritual maturity.

M – Mentorship

- Older individuals have much to offer through mentoring younger generations, passing on wisdom, life lessons, and spiritual guidance. This can be a season of giving back and investing in others.

Titus 2:2-3: "Teach the older men to be temperate... Likewise, teach the older women to be reverent in the way they live...." The Bible encourages the elderly to share their knowledge and guide the next generation.

E – Endurance

- Endurance is critical in old age—both physically and spiritually. It is about finishing well, maintaining faith, and continuing to walk closely with God despite difficulties or limitations.

Hebrews 12:1 "...let us run with endurance the race that is set before us." Endurance is a hallmark of perseverance and faithfulness throughout life.

O - Openness

- Openness in old age involves being open to God's continued work in one's life, new experiences, learning, and relationships. It can also mean being open-hearted in sharing stories, wisdom, and experiences with others.

Psalm 92:14 "They will still bear fruit in old age, they will stay fresh and green." Staying open to God's purposes ensures that one's later years are vibrant and purposeful despite difficulties or limitations. Other events in Cameo to date included a Soup Lunch followed by a quiz and a very informative presentation by Jill Lester about the recent visit to the U.K. by the Abaana Childrens Choir.



The Cameo programme finishes this year on December 19th with a short Communion Service followed by our annual Cameo Christmas Dinner and some festive entertainment. This is an annual event that we all look forward to and really enjoy.




LADIES BIBLE GROUP

GOD'S CREATION

We love getting out and about in our beautiful world! There are so many places near us where we can enjoy God's creation together as a family. We learn to appreciate it and praise its Maker, which ignites a passion to look after it.

There are lots of ways to look after God's world. As a family, we're keen to reduce our household waste. In Northern Ireland, the average person produces 509kg of waste a year and only around 50% of this is recycled.

This year we made blackberry jam. We picked blackberries from the garden and we heated them with sugar. We reused glass jars to store the jam in. The great thing about glass is that it can be recycled infinitely without losing its quality. In Northern Ireland we recycle around 32,000 tonnes of glass every year. The energy saved by recycling one glass bottle is enough to power a TV for 20 minutes. It is better to reuse glass bottles and jars as that saves even more energy. (Esme, age 8)

We go to Sonas (Lisburn's refill shop) every Thursday to collect our vegetables. Refill shops are a great way to save waste. You can use your own jars or get some from the refill shop. In ours you can get things like snacks, fruit and vegetables, drinks, soaps and shampoo - you can get the exact amount you need, so you don't need to waste anything. It's easy and doesn't make much waste. (Miriam, age 10)



Reducing our waste is a way of looking after our environment and living a more sustainable life. We are called as Christians to be stewards of the world and to praise God as we look after His creation.

Come Lord, come down, come in, come among us. Come as the wind to move us; come as the light to prove us; come as the night to rest us; come as the storm to test us; come as the sun to warm us; come as the stillness to calm us; come Lord, come down, Come in, come among us. GERMANY AND UKRAINE FAMILY ROAD TRIP Sam Shaw

In July we covered 5000 miles from Lisburn, driving through Ireland, France, Belgium, Germany, Poland, Ukraine and back again.

In Germany we were able to equip a refugee family with all they need to do puppet shows like we do here. As I write this, they are preparing for Christmas programs in Ukrainian churches in Germany. While we were with them, we shared in many different churches, mostly Protestant, but also a couple Greek Catholic/Orthodox churches. The response from the people, no matter what kind of church, was very positive, they really listened. In one church we were told, "this is the first time we have smiled and laughed since the war started." The faith was vibrant, and they were so active in their churches.




Along the way to Ukraine, we slept in a church's Sunday school room in Katowice, Poland. This was where refugees had stayed coming from Ukraine and now many who are returning stay on their way home. We struggled with the heat along this journey, 35+C, in Ukraine even the generator we brought two years ago had a heat sensor fail. The church in Ukraine told us if we hadn't been there, they would not have attempted to do the Holiday Bible club. The rest of the summer after we left, they ran a shorter version every Friday. While we were there it was 6 hours each day, two home cooked meals, an hour with us, crafts, sports, games English class, and small groups. It was an amazing experience to be part of.



We saw many sobering sights in Ukraine, ambulances taking the wounded to western hospitals, the physical damage, and the memorials in Kyiv. Hardest of all were the stories we heard from the friends we made.

We are praying about returning next July to a different region. This comes from a "chance" conversation in one of the churches in Germany we will be exploring. Please join us in prayer for this possible project!



GENEROSITY INITIATIVE-JANUARY 2025

What images does the word '**Generosity**' bring to your mind? Perhaps someone has offered you their seat in a bus or let you go ahead of them in a queue. Or you may have received a card of encouragement or an unexpected present?

One Saturday morning, Ruth and I sat down in a café just outside Hillsborough for coffee and scones. There was a woman sitting on her own at the next table to us in the café with whom we got into conversation. This woman left the café first and when we went to ask for our bill, the waitress told us that the lady sitting at the next table to us had paid for our coffees and scones as well as her own. We had never met this woman before and all we knew about her was her first name and the town she lived in. We had no way of thanking her or returning the favour. That was generosity – caring for the needs of others and then taking action to meet those needs.

Do you think God is generous?

If we turn to the Psalms, we can find an answer to this question:

The eyes of all look to you, and you give them their food at the proper time. You open your hand and satisfy the desires of every living thing Psalm 145:15-16

On Sunday 5 January, we will be starting a fourpart mini-series in Lisburn Cathedral which will look at the generous life that we are called to as disciples of Jesus.

In the first week, we will look at the many ways that God has been and continues to be generous to us. We will consider what the Bibles teaches us about how we should respond to God's generosity.



We live in a culture where the demands on our time can be there 24/7. It is easy to fill our lives so full of activities that we don't have time for God or his mission in the world. However, we are called to be members of Christ's church and each person has their own unique part to play in God's plans for the extension of His Kingdom. Where we invest our time, energy and talents reveals what matters most to us. In the second week, we will consider how we can be generous with our **Time and Talents**.

Have you ever noticed how some people do all the talking- chattering endlessly about themselves? Or perhaps we only half listen to what someone else is saying, because we are so busy framing our next thoughts about us? We will continue our series, by considering how we can be generous in our **Talking** – our conversations, our comments about people, our prayers and in sharing our story.

Many people spend their lives searching for treasure – bigger homes, nicer cars, more clothes, better food, or luxurious holidays. Perhaps we have done that ourselves? However, Jesus talked about a different type of treasure that we should be seeking, likening the Kingdom of heaven to a treasure hidden in a field. We will finish the series by discussing Jesus' teaching about our **Treasures** and possessions and how we can put our earthly treasures to work for Jesus.

While most people approve of the concept of generosity, I wonder if like me, you sometimes find it much more difficult to put generosity into practice. Please join us as we learn together about the life that God desires for us.

CHURCH HALL PROGRESS AND PLANS

As we approach the end of another year, I'd like to take this opportunity to highlight the work we have been able to do on the hall, and the funds raised to date. The overall estimated cost is £500,000. To date we have spent around £35,000 and raised £80,000 from a combination of regular donations, one off gifts, fundraising events and the Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council (LCCC) grant.

New Windows Fitted

The replacement of the windows was a major improvement, supported by the parish and Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council, replacing rotting and damaged woodwork with the new aluminium frames and glazing. The new windows can be opened with ease and enhance the building's insulation notably, while also looking great.

The Next Phase of Work.

Further work is still needed, but we want to be sure we can safely finance the remaining works; re-pointing the brick work, damp repairs, chimney repairs, guttering and drain repairs along with re-roofing, improving the insulation and re-decoration, while continuing to meet all of our existing commitments and outreach aims.

Appreciation for Contributions Given

For those of you who have already contributed and continue to do so, this is very much appreciated and is a great start towards applying for supporting grants.

For those of you who have not yet been able to contribute, I'd ask you give some thought to this. Consider how often the hall features in our weekly activities, how often you and your family have attended memorable events hosted there and what the Cathedral would be like, if the hall was to become unusable. See also the great potential for this building to use to reach others for Christ, to bless our members and to be a great resource for the local community.

Wonderful People

We are very blessed in the Cathedral, with great resources, great staff and an army of willing volunteers, which we should be very thankful for, but we do not have deep pockets. Our monthly income covers our monthly expenses, though there's not much slack for the unexpected, like many households today, so we need our regular free will offering (FWO) to continue to keep pace with our costs.

Grant Applications

We hope to apply for some larger grants to help us reach the target, this is the only realistic way that we're going to get to the final amount. For most of the grants we would like to apply for, we need to show that we've got a larger amount of committed funding, already in place. That doesn't necessarily mean cash in the bank right now, although that always helps.

CHURCH HALL PROGRESS AND PLANS CONT'D

How You Can Help

What is needed is for you to consider what you could commit to giving over the course of the next 3 years. If we can demonstrate promises of donations, we can use this along with already collected money to apply for larger grants that offer to match raised funds. That could mean one lump sum now, or nothing now and one payment in three time, or any kind years' of regular contributions across that time. With that kind of long term committed funding, it opens a lot more doors for us in terms of eligibility to apply for bigger grants.

Regular commitments are one way to support the Hall Fund but other options also exist and if you'd like to talk to someone about these, for one off donations, legacies, Gift Aid, fund raising ideas or other forms of support, then please do speak to myself or Lee and we'll be very happy to chat through the possibilities.

As we start a new year, the finance committee may also seek to speak directly to those of you who may be able to help through your experience in property related work, finance, grant application work, website maintenance or other areas of support for this long term project. Your help would be very much appreciated.
